





Theory of Broken Windows



- The broken window is a
 metaphor for how behavioral
 norms breakdown in a
 community.
- Once people begin disregarding norms that keep order in a community, both order and community loosen.
- As days go by, people feel less shy and less reserved about things getting from bad to worse.

Once it gets unstitched in one place, it goes opening out until it can get to the worst.



The garbage of over one billion people

- So like me, like you, like my neighbour everyone in India is throwing garbage at the street corner.
- The result of our **rationality** (justification) is the huge garbage heap of a country of over one billion people.
- If an attitude is rational for me, it is rational enough for everyone else.

From bad to worse, things get faster





From bad to worse it keeps expanding









I am NOT (alone) responsible for this



- But everybody else is doing it...
- Everybody is throwing garbage on the street, why shouldn't I?...
- Everybody is jumping the queue, why shouldn't !?
- Everybody is being corrupt, so shouldn't I accept that bribe?

 If an attitude is rational for me, it is rational enough for everyone else.

Kitchen waste of one more household

- Segregating waste at the household levels seems such a waste of time, considering that the streets are anyway dirty.
- And the kitchen waste of just one more household is unlikely to make much of a difference to the overall sanitation of the surrounding.
- Why sacrifice one's self interest for the sake of the community?
- Selfishness seems to tell each and every Indian that it is entirely rational for us to chuck our kitchen waste at the street corner.

What difference can I alone make?


- Surely, the entire pool can't get dirty just because I urinate in it.
- What does it matter if I alone come in late, in any case not many people are going to be punctual.
- How can my not throwing that piece of paper on the street clean up the whole city?
- What does it matter if I alone keep my high beam on while driving at night?
- Will the country's water table get any higher just because I alone invest in a rainwater harvesting system for my house, or remember not to run my wash-basin tap full blast while shaving?

The danger is, this is expanding




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Tear a little, it becomes easier later on... ... and much easier as you go on.

Three Clear Reasons

- Firstly, as we ourselves are unfair to varying degrees it does not shock us when we encounter unfairness in others.
- Secondly, we are glib with our words. We can rationalize (justify) almost anything with verbiage (talk).
- Third, what can I alone do? We reason.

Why don't we pass a law / an Act?

- I am not allowed to smoke in a public place
- I am not allowed to spit on the road
- It seems they will bring a law that I should not defecate in open
- This is atrocious.
- India is becoming less democratic, isn't it?

What is democracy?

- One of the core principles of democracy is:
 Self-regulation.
- When people don't self-regulate themselves, an external regulation (like a law / act / imposed fine) becomes necessary.
- But it is not characteristic of a 'real democracy'

Am I a Swachh Citizen?

- I expect a public toilet to be clean when I enter.
- But, unfortunately, everyone likes a clean toilet, which I think is an unfair expectation.
- How does my rationality sound?

Social Norm



- Norm = that which is considered 'normal' in Indian society.
- The **broken window** is a *metaphor* for ways behavioral norms break down in a community.
- If one person scrawls graffiti on the wall, others will soon be using chalk pieces, pens and what not.
- Minor offenses like graffiti, spitting in public places, littering, flipping a cigarette butt etc. send a signal that broken-window behavior has started operating. Once started, then there is no stopping it.

I am not responsible for this

- Nobody likes to live on a pile of garbage.
- Everyone of us think 'I am not responsible for this garbage to have piled up here'.
- Nor am I responsible to clean up this'
- But you can be responsible not to add one more bit of garbage to it

Some Practical Suggestions (What you and I can do?)

Practical Suggestion – 1

Believe sincerely that ONE PERSON CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

Practical Suggestion – 2:

- Be very conscious not to litter for 40 days, as a vow / pledge.
- You shall witness in 40 days, it becomes part of your habit.
- You shall discover that it is true they say: 'repeated action becomes habit'.

Practical Suggestion – 3:

- When you are shopping everyday, say: 'NO', to plastic carry bags.(carry your own bag)
- And Feel proud to count how many carry bags you have avoided in a day, ...and thus day after day, and month after month.
- By doing this your family has fallen in line with you in not littering.

4. We can reduce waste generation by 80%



- Count the number of carry bags you can avoid, if you carry your own bag at all.
- Count the number of water bottle you can avoid, if you care to carry your own water bottle.
- Segregation of waste at household level can reduce the load your GP needs to deal with.
- Each one of us can, for sure, reduce the amount of waste we create by almost 50%
