

Information Note



More than 80 per cent of rural India's employed population earn their livelihoods in the informal economy. A prepondernat majority of non-agicutural enterprises are part of the informal sector. These units and workers operate outside the ambit of formal institutional setup. Informal workers and economic units, although contribute to economic and social development, are not protected, regulated, well recognised or

valued. This leaves a majority of informal economy workers and their families outside the benefit of public policy. To ensure employment generation at a rising levels of productivity, skill development of entrepreneurs and workers engaged therein will be crucial. In recent years, the Central Government has embraced the promotion of a formalization drive, both for enterprises and workers with ever greater enthusiasm. A series of policy initiatives such as Goods and Service Tax (GST), demonetization, reforms in banking transactions, the ease of doing business, direct benefit transfers (DBT), fintech solutions and ICT/digitization have been rolled out in an attempt to transcend informal enterprises and workers to a formal setup and improve their accessibility to formal institutions and improve their livelihood status. Towards formalizing labour and employment, portals such as Udyam,E-Shram, NCS and ASEEM have been created to address the issues of jobs, skills, social security etc. However, these initiatives have not only created opportunities but also thrown challenges, threat and apprehensions.

In this context, the said training programme has been designed to equip and empower the rural informal entrepreneurs to upgrade their knowledge and approaches to be part of formal institutional network and gain from these instituins. The training programme will facilitate detail understanding on the informal enterprise sector and its various issues such as skill, technology, marketing, finance and so on. It will also improve our understanding on the role of formal institutions in supporting the informal enterprises to transcend to formal sector and expand their scale of operation and local employment. After the programme, the participants will be able to guide informal rural entrepreneurs to reap benefits from the formal institutions and grow their business. The training programme will also help in understanding various government schemes and policies towards skill development and employment generation in rural areas.




- To familiarise the emerging challenges faced by rural informal sector admist Covid 19 and subsequent intense and prolonged lockdown;

Training pedagogy:

Training methods will comprise of classroom lectures, group discussions, presentations and exposure visit. Presentations on good practices/ successful models will also be discussed. Pre (& post) test/quiz and all sessions are mandatory. Detailed evaluation/feedabck on the training programmes from the participants will be taken on online Training Management Portal (TMP).

SELECTION GUIDELINE:

- 1. Please note that mere nomination of a candidate does not necessarily guarantee that s/he will be selected. Selection will be made, keeping the broad objectives of training programme. Attempt will be made to select participants from various states, organizations, agencies and gender. Preference will be given to them who are currently working or prior experience of working on the key issues addressed in this training programme. Those who are currently working, they should get their nomination form duly forwarded from the competent authority.
- 2. * There is no training fees. But to and fro travel expenses of the selected participants attending the programme must be borne by their nominating / sponsoring agencies and/or by the participants themselves.
- 3. This programme is residential in nature. NIRDPR will provide accommodation to all selected participants in its Guest House (on twin sharing basis) and will only bear boarding and lodging expenses for the selected participants. Participants are expected to reach NIRD on 11th December evening and leave NIRD on either late evening on 16th or early morning on 17th December 2022.
