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CHAPTER 1

OVERVIEW

Recognising the need for more focus on strengthening Panchayati Raj System and Capacity Building of PRI functionaries as per the decision of the General Council of the Institute, the name of NIRD has been changed as National Institute of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj (NIRD&PR) w.e.f December 4, 2013.

National Institute of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj (NIRD&PR), an autonomous organisation under the Ministry of Rural Development, is a premier national centre of excellence in rural development. NIRD&PR builds capacities of rural development functionaries, elected representatives, academicians and other stakeholders through inter-related activities of training, research and consultancy. It aims to:

- (i) organise training programmes, conferences, seminars and workshops for senior level development managers, elected representatives, bankers, NGOs and other stakeholders
- (ii) undertake, aid, promote and coordinate research

- (iii) study functioning of the Panchayati Raj Institutions and rural development programmes across the States
- (iv) analyse and propose solutions to problems in planning and implementation of the programmes for rural development and
- (v develop content and disseminate information through periodicals, reports, e-modules and other publications

The Institute has the mandate to facilitate development of rural poor and enhance their quality of life. Considering the huge and varied challenges faced in the development of rural poor across the country, NIRD&PR as an apex Institute has to address the training and capacity development needs of a large clientele. Its clientele includes development functionaries, elected PRI representatives at different levels, NGOs, Bankers and other stakeholders working in the field of rural development. Capacity building of development functionaries and elected representatives is a pre-condition in the entire rural development process to make the policy formulation and implementation effective. The Institute acts as a "thinktank" of Ministry of Rural Development and undertakes training and research including action research on various flagship programmes of the Ministry. The Institute's services are also available to other Ministries / Departments of the Central and State Governments, banking institutions, public and private sector organisations, civil societies, Panchayati Raj Institutions and other national and international agencies connected with rural development.

In more than 50 years of its existence, NIRD&PR has been playing its own modest but credible role to facilitate qualitative changes in programme management through a process of training, research, action research, consultancy, information dissemination and information building. This has enabled the Institute to emerge as the National Apex Institute in the area of rural development and Panchayati Raj.

Established in 1983 at Guwahati, North-Eastern Regional Centre of NIRD&PR is recognised as a premier organisation in the field of rural development catering to the capacity building needs of development functionaries of the region. During 30 years of its existence, this Centre has developed expertise and experience in serving the specific training and research needs of the north-eastern region. The Eastern Regional Centre (ERC) of the Institute started training activities at Patna in 2008 to cater to the training needs on rural development issues of eastern region of the country. A Centre of the Institute also started conducting training activities at Jaipur in 2010.

Activities of the Institute

Training Activities

Emphasis on capacity building of rural development functionaries and other stakeholders has been the major goal of training programmes organised by NIRD&PR. The Institute has been enlarging its canvas of training activities every year in sustained manner and also has been successful in making them more need-based and focused. The Institute could achieve a very high rate of satisfaction of participants by evolving and adopting new training methods and techniques on continuous basis. Besides, the findings of the research studies and action research are utilised in training programmes as training inputs. NIRD&PR has expertise and good infrastructure to train senior and middle level development functionaries engaged policy formulation, in management and implementation of rural development programmes. The training and teaching programmes are intended to create knowledge base, develop skills and infuse right attitudes and values.

There has been a significant improvement in the outreach programmes, and the Institute could organise the largest number of 1130 training programmes during the year with participation of a large number of officials associated with rural development departments, PRI

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functionaries, representatives of NGOs, PSUs, academicians and SHGs, against 1100 training programmes originally proposed. Further, these training programmes have also attracted a significant number of international participants across the world particularly from developing countries of Asia and Africa.

The Institute has also been able to increase the number of training programmes over the years on sustained basis and the data for the last five years are given below:

By organising 1130 programmes, a total of 31,640 participants were trained in 2013-14 as against 28,210 persons trained in 998 programmes during the corresponding period of previous year.

During 2013-14, NIRD&PR organised several workshops, seminars, symposiums and national consultations and the deliberations of these meetings were published as reports and books. Among them, a two - day National Workshop for the District Collectors of the Left Wing Extremist (LWE) districts on 'Strategies for Development' during 13-14 September, 2013 and a two-day National Consultation on "Rural Unorganised Labour" organised during 28-29 June, 2013 were the two big events.

Building the training capacities of its link institutions, i.e. the State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs) and Extension Training Centres (ETCs), is integral to Institute's mandate. Significant increase in the demand for training programmes during the year led to organising of 857 off-campus and regional programmes. These programmes mainly focused on various aspects of rural development including flagship programmes of the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India.

The Institute is also serving as a specialised organisation in imparting training skills to officials and non-officials of various institutes including banks involved in rural development. About 638 bank officials belonging to Union Bank, Punjab National Bank, Canara Bank, Corporation Bank, etc., were trained on various aspects of rural credit management.

Based on requests received from various ministries and departments of Government of India and State Governments, the Institute has undertaken various training programmes on themes required by them. The Institute also organised a number of international training programmes for the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India and others. It works in close coordination with international organisations like AARDO, CIRDAP, UN Women, etc. NIRD&PR organised programmes on ICT in Rural Development at CIRDAP ICT Centre at Dhaka, Bangladesh during this year.

Exposure Visits

It is pertinent to mention that during the year, the inter-institutional collaborations were stepped up considerably. During the period under reference, Mr. MD Mashiur Rahman, DG, Bangladesh Academy of Rural Development, Bangladesh, Dr. Daniel Peter Othol, South Sudan Ambassador, Mr. Jonathan Wutawunashe, Zimbabwe High Commissioner, a batch of nine IAS officers (2012) batch of AP Cadre, IPS Officers from SVPNPA, Hyderabad, Probationary Deputy Collectors (Group-I) of Govt. of AP, Students from University of Alberta, Canada visited NIRD&PR and interacted with the Director General and faculty members on Indian experiences in rural development.

Research Activities

Research conducted by the Institute is field-based in nature with emphasis on current rural development issues. It helps to understand various grassroot level issues pertaining to rural development. It also assists in policy formulation for rural development and forms an important input in Institute's training programmes.

During the year, the Institute conducted several research studies to identify contemporary problems and issues pertaining to programme implementation and to suggest alternative strategies for improving effectiveness of various programmes and schemes. The Ministry placed increased importance on the feedback provided through the research studies taken up by the Institute. The direct approach to tackling development issues related to the 'quality of life' of the rural poor has been the focal area of research. During the period, NIRD&PR has taken up 54 research studies (research, action research and village adoption). Greater emphasis was placed on organising regular Study Forum meetings of faculty to discuss the research study findings and finalise the research reports.

The Institute has undertaken location-specific action research in which a theme or a model is field tested, step-by-step, while actually implementing the project on the ground. Day-to-day interventions are modified according to the situation prevailing in the location. The main focus is to evolve people-centered approach in planning and implementation with local decision making and participatory evaluation. It is in fact, a process of learning while doing. Action research projects have been taken up on the specific subjects.

In order to further strengthen the action research initiatives of the Institute at micro-level and also promote capacities of faculty members to facilitate effective implementation of rural development and poverty alleviation programmes, emphasis has been given on 'village adoption' studies by adopting villages from the remote and backward areas of different parts of the country. It enables NIRD&PR faculty members to keep themselves abreast with grassroot realities and development challenges.

NIRD&PR provides consultancy support to various international and national organisations on different development themes. The Institute also takes up studies on the request of MoRD and other Central ministries and State departments.

> Special Projects - Technology Applications in Rural Development and Resource Cells

Centre for Geo-Informatic Applications in Rural Development

Recognising the emerging application of Geoinformatics in various rural sectors, Centre on Geo-Informatic Applications in Rural Development (C-GARD) of the Institute designs specialised programmes for imparting skills and improving knowledge levels in the latest Geomatics technology and tools. The Centre organised specific customised training programmes in Geo-informatics Technology Applications in areas related to planning, monitoring, modelling, and decision support systems on Watershed, MGNREGS, Agriculture Development, Environmental Assessment, Conservation Practices, Resources Planning, Infrastructure Development, and Village Planning, etc. The Centre is also sensitising policymakers, elected representatives of the people, civil servants, field level implementing agencies and NGOs in the usage of geoinformatics technology. Based on approval accorded by the Government of India, further steps have been taken to operationalise the process of establishment of C-GARD Centres in five countries of Africa viz. Kenya, Algeria, Niger, Equatorial Guinea and Madagascar in a phased manner to strengthen India's partnership with Africa. In addition to it, steps were taken to establish two GARD centres at SIRD, Kerala and SIRD, Tamil Nadu.

Rural Technology Park (RTP)

The Institute has established Rural Technology Park (RTP) in 1999 to serve as a catalyst to accelerate wide dissemination of appropriate and affordable technologies to the rural poor including youth and women for enhancing their livelihoods to achieve the objective of improving their quality of life. In RTP, National Rural Building Centre showcases cost-effective models of rural houses with 40 different technologies, which are applicable to different geographical regions of rural India. In addition, Sanitation Park is also established with a good number of models of individual hygienic toilets which are affordable by the rural masses. RTP has also obtained ISO 9001-2008. NIRD&PR is in the process of establishing Rural Technology Parks in five African countries, namely, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Congo, Cote-de-Ivore and South Sudan in a phased manner under India-Africa Forum Summit-II (IAFS) of Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

Resource cells of the Institute are the nodal agency for infrastructure creation under RSETI Project of Ministry of Rural Development. The project aims at setting up of micro-enterprises by the rural youth through skill development and credit facilitation. NIRD&PR is the lead national level coordinating agency for appraisal and monitoring of placement linked skill development projects, Himayat projects (for Jammu and Kashmir) and Parvaaz (for Minority communities) under the Swarnjayanti Gram Swarojgar Yojana (SGSY) special projects of the Ministry. It also acts as a nodal agency for release of funds received from the Ministry of Rural Development to all the State Rural Livelihood Missions (SRLMs) and Project Implementing Agencies (PIAs).

During the year, the Institute gave more focus on National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), by catering to capacity development requirements of key functionaries, bank officials and other stakeholders involved in implementation of the programme. With a view to creating awareness and exposure among stakeholders at district, block and sub-block level, NIRD&PR organised brainstorming workshops and consultations on concept, objectives, strategies, framework and operationalisation of NRLM through State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs), Extension Training Centres (ETCs), Regional Institutes of Rural Development (RIRDs) and other reputed institutions. Under the National Training Action Plan for Training of Trainers (ToT) Programme on NRLM, NIRD&PR in collaboration with SIRDs and ETCs, conducted 601 training programmes in which 16,590 officials, PRI members, SHG members, NGOs and Animators from across the country were trained. Most of these programmes were conducted in the high poverty affected regions of the country, where the performance in implementation of NRLM needed further improvement. A special focus has been given to States like Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal, Chhattisgarh, Uttar Pradesh and North-Eastern States i.e., Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Tripura, Mizoram, Manipur and Nagaland.

UN Women project on "Promoting Women's Political Leadership and Governance in India and South Asia", supported by Ministry of Panchayati Raj, Government of India, taken up by NIRD&PR in 2012-13 concluded in the month of June, 2013. The project was implemented in 16 districts of five States - Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha and Rajasthan. As part of the project, two training modules were developed - Trainers Manual on "Promoting Women's Political Leadership and Gender Responsive Governance" and Trainers Module on "Promoting Women's Political Leadership and Livelihood" - and were provided to the training institutes for facilitating training programmes for PRIs.



Academic Programmes

In its continuous efforts to develop managerial skills of functionaries involved in rural development process, the Institute introduced a one-year Post Graduate Diploma Programme in Rural Development Management (PGDRDM) in the year 2008. The sixth batch of PGDRDM of 49 students including six in-service international candidates from CIRDAP and AARDO member countries like Fiji, Ghana, Myanmar, Nepal, Nigeria, the Philippines and Sudan, started in August, 2013. The seventh batch of the programme commenced in January 2014. In furtherance of the Institute's initiative for wider outreach, a Distance Education Cell (DEC) was established in the year 2010 and a one-year PG Diploma in Sustainable Rural Development (PGDSRD) was introduced. The fifth batch commenced from January, 2014 and 99 students were admitted. To address the need for developing a welltrained set of specialised tribal development professionals, the Institute also started a one-year Post Graduate Diploma Programme in Tribal Development (PGDTDM) in distance mode in January, 2013. The second batch of the Programme commenced from January, 2014 and 28 students were admitted.

Documentation and Information Dissemination

NIRD&PR has a mandate to disseminate information on rural development. The Institute continued its efforts in publishing literature on rural development issues during the year. As a leading publisher of rural development literature in India, NIRD&PR endeavours to share its research findings, observed field realities and views on issues of current topical importance with policy planners, academics and others through its regular publications, occasional papers, etc. The quarterly "Journal of Rural Development" published by the Institute occupies a place of pride among leading academic journals on rural development and decentralised governance. NIRD&PR Newsletter 'Pragati' in English and Hindi is also published to provide wide publicity to training programmes and also highlight various activities undertaken by the Institute on a regular basis. The Institute is also publishing a Quarterly Newsletter of Rural Self Employment Training Institutions (RSETIs) "Enterprise", covering news from various RSETIs across the country. Additionally, the Institute brings out more publications under research report series, case study series and action research series. The Institute houses the largest library on rural development in Asia with a collection of 1,16,277 books and brings out several information products and services. The library also subscribes to various online databases relating to rural development and allied aspects. The rural development database maintained in the library consists of over two lakh references.

Administration and Finance

Administration and Finance wings of NIRD&PR support and facilitate faculty members in undertaking training, research and consultancy activities of the Institute. The Institute is situated in an area of about 174.21 acres with infrastructure facilities like faculty buildings, administrative buildings, library, hostels, conference halls with modern audio-visual aids, auditorium, community hall, health centre, sports complex, residential quarters, staff canteen, crèche, yoga and gymnasium. The Institute has a well-equipped computer centre for in-house and classroom training, information management system (MIS),documentation and data processing. In order to provide more conducive environment for carrying out the various activities, emphasis is given to upscale and expand the existing infrastructure facilities of the Institute on continuous basis.

TRAINING

Training plays a pivotal role in capacity building for rural development. NIRD&PR has expertise and good infrastructure to train senior and middle level development officials, elected representatives and other stakeholders engaged in policy formulation, management and implementation of rural development programmes. The programmes are intended to create knowledge base, develop skills and infuse right attitudes and values among the participants of training programmes. The Institute could achieve a high level of satisfaction of participants by evolving and adopting new training methods and techniques on a continuous basis. It has led to improvement in the quality of training programmes while making them more need-based and focused. Besides, the findings of research studies and action research are utilised in most of the training programmes as training inputs. Further, these training programmes also attracted a significant number of international participants across the world particularly from developing countries of Asia and Africa. As part of this endeavour, training programmes addressing various capacity building needs in respect of poverty alleviation and rural development programmes are organised. The Institute has mandate to help and build training capacities of its link institutions i.e. State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs) and Extension Training Centres (ETCs).

During 2013-14, the Institute organised 1130 training programmes as against 1100 training programmes planned. The year saw an all-time high number of training programmes and also participants (31,640). The average score of effectiveness of training programmes was 85 per cent. Details of training programmes conducted and categories of participants at Headqaurters, Hyderabad and three Regional Centres are given in Annexures-I to V.

CHAPTER

The main themes include convergence in MGNREGA, promotion of rural livelihoods and micro-enterprises, social audit, decentralised planning, good governance through Panchayati Raj Institutions, rural credit management, drinking water and sanitation, NRM, gender budgeting, applications of GIS and ICT technologies for rural development, etc.

Analysis of Training Programmes

During the year 2013-14, NIRD&PR organised a total number of 1130 programmes, which include 1030 programmes conducted at Hyderabad, 66 programmes by NERC, Guwahati, 4 programmes by ERC, Patna and 30 programmes by Jaipur Centre, Jaipur.

Regional and Off-Campus Training Programmes

In order to meet the State-specific requirements in the field of rural development and Panchayati Raj and to build the capacities of the faculty members of SIRDs, ETCs and other RD and PR institutions, 857 Regional and off-campus programmes were organised by the Institute and its Regional Centres. These include 852 Regional Programmes conducted by NIRD&PR, Hyderabad, 3 Programmes conducted by NIRD&PR, Guwahati and 2 programmes conducted by NIRD&PR, JC.



Profile of Participants

As evident from Table 3, majority of the participants of the training programmes were government officials. A sizable number of participants were from NGOs, CBOs and PRIs. Significant increase has been noticed in the number of international participants and that of from financial institutions.

Training Programmes on NRLM

During the year, the Institute gave focus on National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), by catering to capacity development requirements of stakeholders, key officials and bank officials involved in implementation of rural development. With a view to creating awareness and exposure among stakeholders at district, block and sub-block level, NIRD&PR organised brainstorming workshops and consultations on concept, objectives, strategies, framework and operationalisation of NRLM through State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs), Extension Training Centres (ETCs)/Regional Institutes of Rural Development (RIRDs) and other reputed institutions. Under the National Training Action Plan for Training of Trainers (ToT) Programme on NRLM (SGSY) for the year 2013-14, sanctioned by the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India, NIRD&PR in collaboration with SIRDs and ETCs, conducted 601 ToT-III training programmes on SGSY/NRLM. Most of these programmes were conducted in the high poverty affected regions of the country, where the performance in implementation of SGSY/NRLM needed further improvement. Special focus has been given to States like Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal, Chhattisgarh, Uttar Pradesh and North-Eastern States i.e., Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Tripura, Mizoram, Manipur and Nagaland.

Training Programmes on IAY

Rural Housing Division of the MoRD, Gol requested NIRD&PR for organising 90 training programmes on 'Planning and Management of Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY)' for the year 2013-14. These programmes were organised in different States like Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Jammu and Kashmir, Karnataka, Kerala, Maharashtra, Meghalaya, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Madhya Pradesh and West Bengal.

Training Quality Improvement Measures (T-QIM) Committee

In order to make the training more effective, measures to improve the qualitative aspects of the training programmes have always been the top priority of the Institute. In this regard, a Training Quality Improvement Measures Committee (TQIM-C) was constituted with members drawn from internal and external subject experts to review the concerned course materials and offer suggestive measures to ensure high impact of training. The Committee, constituted in October, 2011 meets once in a month and suggests the required measures for improvement of programmes to be organised in the ensuing month.

Training Feedback

At the end of each training programme, performance of training programmes is evaluated on a five-point scale with reference to important components such as training design, training methods, training materials, speakers' effectiveness, boarding and lodging facilities, library facilities, etc., so as to take steps to improve the training programmes. The overall average score for the training programmes organised during 2013-14 was 85 per cent.

Study-cum-Exposure Visits to NIRD&PR

Due to its expertise and strength as an apex training and research Institute in the field of rural development, NIRD&PR attracts various institutions in the form of Study-cum-exposure visits. During the year under report, several study-cum-exposure visits were organised by the Institute at the instance of National and International organisations. RESEARCH

Research is one of the strengths of NIRD&PR on wide range of dimensions pertaining to rural development. It helps in understanding emerging rural development trends arising from time to time. Besides addressing contemporary issues, research also aims to focus on current best practices in the area of rural development. Further, the research is useful in bringing out appropriate insights for discussion in training programmes conducted by the Institute. Thus, in overall perspective, NIRD&PR research enables the Institute to build up database on rural development interventions, successful interventions, analysis of wide range of socio- economic conditions with a view to coming up with alternative measures and so on. The research outcome is utilised as training input in the form of case presentations, case discussions etc. Given the wide range of experiences and exposure in rural development among the faculty members, the Institute undertakes consultancy research studies for other Ministries of Government of India, State Governments and Corporate Organisations on various issues pertaining to rural development.

NIRD&PR carries out the research through the faculty members of SIRDs, keeping in view the mandate of promoting research capabilities of State Institutions. Studies are also undertaken in collaboration with reputed research institutions.

Objectives

CHAPTER

The research studies are conducted with the following objectives:

- Understanding the changing rural socioeconomic scenario with focus on Rural Development Flagship Programmes;
- Identifying major constraints in implementation of RD programmes;
- Suggesting suitable policy and programme interventions for improving the overall performance of RD programmes; and
- Producing course material for Training Programmes.

Research Themes

Keeping in view the changing socio-economic conditions and the implementation of various development interventions, the themes of research undergo changes from time to time. The focus of research undertaken during the reporting period was on the following themes:

Categories of Research Studies

Keeping in view the quality and quantitative issues to be addressed, NIRD&PR research studies are broadly undertaken through three broad categories and these are:-

- i. Research Projects / Studies
- ii. SIRD / Other Institution Collaborative Studies
- iii. Case Studies

The first category of Research Projects/Studies are especially those studies which were undertaken on macro-levelissues. The second category of SIRD/ other Institutions collaborative studies are especially undertaken through faculty members of SIRDs and reputed National institutions in collaboration with faculty of NIRD&PR. The third category of studies are basically those studies which focus on successful rural development practices, which are having specific training value.

Research Tools and Techniques

Sample surveys, Structured interviews, Case studies, Participatory learning approaches consisting of PRA techniques, Content analysis, Qualitative assessments and Impact Analysis were a few of the research tools and techniques adopted for the research studies.

Process of Conducting Research Studies

A systematic approach is adopted while undertaking the research studies on various themes identified. At the initial stage, the faculty members at Centre level involve in a consultation under the guidance of Head of the Centre concerned. Based on the internal discussions held, the research proposals then are presented in the internal Study Forum for wider discussion and seeking suggestions. After the presentation in the Study Forum, the proposals then are referred to Research Advisory Committee for comments and suggestions. The revised research proposals are forwarded to Academic Committee of the Institute for approval.

In regard to research studies under the category of SIRD/Collaborative Institutions studies etc., the proposals are referred to an internal committee or subject experts consisting of senior faculty members for their comments and observations. On incorporation of suggestions etc., the proposals are then accorded approval.

Quality Control Measures

Besides the Research Advisory Committee, several measures are also undertaken to ensure quality of research outcome. After completion of the study, the draft report concerned will be presented in the Study Forum for wider discussion. Based on the suggestions emerged, the final version of the research report would emerge. At the time of publication, the research reports are referred to external subject experts for their comments so as to ensure quality research outcome.

During 2013-14, the Institute took up 12 research studies under different categories as mentioned below:





ACTION RESEARCH

Action research takes the researchers much closer to the grassroot problems and prospects while promoting rural development endeavours. Such endeavour also enriches the knowledge base among researchers to understand the issues facilitating rural development processes. Hence, more emphasis has been placed on this particular category of research studies by NIRD&PR.

The focus of NIRD&PR Action Research is to facilitate the operationalisation of decentralised development process and good governance at local level. The 'facilitation' process encompasses social mobilisation, technology transfer for productivity enhancement and value addition, capacity building through training and non-training functions, networking of local institutions, social development, participatory decision making, etc. Action Research is carried out in project villages as "social laboratories". It is taken up in order to test the implementability of policy recommendations and assess the outcomes of such recommendations. The action research projects are people-centered and use participatory tools and techniques to elicit effective participation.

Main Objectives

- To test the implementability of policy recommendations of NIRD&PR research projects and assess the outcomes of such recommendations;
- To find out field level solutions to the critical problems experienced in implementation of RD and Poverty Alleviation programmes;
- iii) To suggest effective strategies for transfer of technology to tiny producers for enhancing their incomes; and
- iv) To experiment with new ideas for achieving development objectives and proposing alternative cost-effective programme interventions.

Given the contemporary research outcomes and the current issues/problems that need immediate attention, NIRD&PR focusses upon several themes for action research. A few of the themes focused upon were:

- Capacity-building and empowerment
- Value addition to NTFP

- Dairy development
- Wage employment
- Disaster management
- Participatory planning
- Application of Geo-informatic technologies
- Gender
- Livelihoods promotions

Focused Areas of Action Research

Within the broad themes identified, specific focused areas were chosen to undertake action research projects. The specific focused areas for action research during 2013-14 were :

- Empowerment of SHG members
- Mobilising and empowering wage seekers
- Promotion of participatory planning by using people-friendly technologies
- Participatory disaster preparedness and management
- Empowering tribal community through developing capacities on value addition to NTFP

Category of Action Research Studies

Based on micro and macro level focus, two types of action research studies are pursued. The first category is conventional action research with emphasis on larger area as well as wider range of issues to be covered. The second category is Village Adoption Studies, wherein the focus is at micro-level by adopting a backward village. Under the second category, instead of identifying the issues and then pursue action research, the faculty members are involved in holistic development of the village through participatory approach and strengthening the capacities of the villagers. The process is then captured through action research methods to bring out learning experiences and distinguish the same in terms of typical conditions prevailing in the village concerned.

Action Research Tools and Techniques

As part of action research, methods like sensitising the targeted community through personal interaction, capacity-building and awareness generation, appropriate skill inculcation and upgradation, mobilising the community for participatory action, survey on socio-economic data, process documentation etc., are adopted.

Process of Conducting Action Research

Based on the issues identified through formal research, NIRD&PR faculty identifies focused areas for action research intervention. The proposal is then generated and discussed at internal forum and then the process as adopted under formal research is followed.

Action Research Studies Taken up

During the year 2013-14, no fresh formal action research study is taken up since the duration of action research projects taken up during the previous year spans over the period under reference. However, under Village Adoption category studies, Five studies were taken up during the year. The on-going action research and Village Adoption Studies are presented in **Table 1 & 2**. The list of new studies is presented in **Table 3**.

Action Research Studies Completed

During the year, action research on "Disaster Resilient Gram Panchayat: Making A Model" was completed.

New Initiatives Under Village Adoption Studies

Besides encouraging the NIRD&PR faculty members to undertake Village Adoption studies, similar emphasis has also been placed on Studies in collaboration with Bankers through Rural Technology Park initiatives. As part of this endeavour, the Rural Technology Park division of the Institute has taken a lead in collaboration with Banking Institutions to adopt villages for social and economic development. The approach was quite successful since many a banking institution expressed their desire for the development of villages on participatory approaches with emphasis on capacitybuilding, facilitating financial assistance, etc. NABARD has also been actively engaged in the exercise. Interactive meetings with banking institutions and officials from NABARD were initiated during the year.

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CHAPTER 6

NETWORKING WITH STATE INSTITUTES OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SIRDs) AND EXTENSION TRAINING CENTRES (ETCs)

NIRD&PR has a mandate to strengthen the SIRDs and ETCs to build the capacities of large mass of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj functionaries through training and retraining. These efforts are expected to result in improved planning and implementation of development programmes. As a part of this networking effort, NIRD&PR has been coordinating several schemes and events as highlighted in this chapter.

Colloquium with State Secretaries Incharge of RD&PR & Heads of SIRDs and Regional Meetings with SIRDs & ETCs

One of the functions of NIRD&PR in relation to networking with SIRDs and ETCs is (a) convening of annual Colloquium with Heads of SIRDs in which the Secretaries in charge of RD&PR are also invited and (b) organising of Regional Meetings with Heads of SIRDs & ETCs. While the Colloquium facilitates to have an overview of the SIRD activities in general, the Regional meetings with Heads of SIRDs & ETCs are intended to serve as platform for detailed interaction and networking between NIRD&PR, SIRDs and ETCs. During 2013-14, a one-day Consultative Meeting with Heads of SIRDs was held on 10.4.2013 while two-day meeting was organised with the Principals of Extension Training Centres [ETCs] on May 8-9, 2013 at NIRD&PR. These were aimed at formulation of Guidelines for Model SIRD & ETC in association with the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Government of India.

NIRD&PR Off-campus Training Programmes at SIRDs

With a view to strengthening the capabilities of faculty members of SIRDs, NIRD&PR evolved the scheme of conduct of off-campus programmes at different SIRDs. As per the system in vogue, at the beginning of the year, the programmes to be offered at each SIRD will be decided upon by NIRD&PR as per norms, in consultation with them and the same are included in NIRD&PR Annual Training Calendar. During the year under report, NIRD&PR organised as many as 857 offcampus and regional training programmes at different SIRDs. The themes of the programme include:

(1) District Planning, (2) Decentralisation and Panchayati Raj, (3) Agriculture, Horticulture, Livestock,

Fisheries, (4) Micro, Small & Medium Enterprise Development, (5) Rural Technologies, (6) Natural Resources Management, (7) Rural Marketing, (8) MGNREGA, (9) PMGSY, (10) TSC, (11) NRDWP, (12) Watershed (IWMP), (13) IAY, (14) NSAP, (15) NRLM, (16) PURA, (17) BPL Census, (18) Land Management & Administration, (19) Transparency & Accountability, (20) Citizen's Charter & Grievance Redressal, (21) E-Governance, (22) Geographical Information System (GIS), (23) Convergence, (24) Right to Information Act 2005, (25) Office Management, (26) Finance, Accounts and Audit, (27) Leadership, Organisational Behaviour and Inter-Personal Skills (Soft Skills), (28) Project Management Engineering and Estimation, (29) Weaker Sections, Minorities, Women, Children and Disabled, (30) Innovations in Rural Development, (31) Induction Training, (32) Refresher Training, (33) Training of Trainers, (34) Disaster Management, (35) BRGF, (36) Bharat Nirman Volunteers and (37) Health.

The SIRDs were requested to take steps for uploading the Annual Training Calendar (ATC) for the year 2013-14 on the MoRD web portal of www.ruraldiksha.nic.in. and to take steps for sharing training material with other SIRDs and ETCs, by uploading the available material on the MoRD website. Further, the Institutions were requested to initiate action to develop 'E-learning' materials with the guidance of NIRD&PR and the SIRDs like APARD (AP), ANS-SIRD (Karnataka), which got the needed expertise.

The SIRDs were expected to report the monthly training performance to MoRD, in prescribed format, through web-based online-reporting system by registering on MoRD website at www.ruraldiksha.nic.in.

NIRD&PR-State Link Officers (SLOs) Scheme

The scheme was in vogue for the last few years. Under the scheme, Faculty Members are designated as State Link Officers (SLOs), to help and assist the States, SIRDs and ETCs - in the context of imparting training to RD & PR functionaries in a more effective manner. The State Link Oficer (SLO) scheme has been revised with a new set of guidelines and extended to cover other fraternity of Sub-State level RD training institutions viz., RIRDs, ETCs, PRTCs, DIRDs etc., which are working in different States. Under the scheme, SLOs have been providing needed academic support to the State Governments, the SIRDs & ETCs and other RD Training Institutions, in the area of training, research and action research.

Central Scheme for Development of SIRDs and ETCs

The Ministry of Rural Development, under Central scheme of "Management Support to RD Programmes and Strengthening of District Planning System" has been extending support to the training activities of States for effective implementation of rural development programmes by providing financial support to State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs) and Extension Training Centres (ETCs). In this context, the NIRD&PR has been mandated to channelise the funding support to SIRDs & ETCs by way of scrutinising the proposals and making SIRD-ETC specific recommendations to MoRD to consider sanction of funding support under Central scheme.

a. Strengthening of State Institutes of Rural Development (SIRDs)

The SIRDs aim at improving the knowledge, skill and attitude of rural development functionaries and elected representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions at State and district level. At present, there are 28 SIRDs, one in each State.

100 per cent Central assistance is provided by MoRD to SIRDs and ETCs for non-recurring expenditure for strengthening of infrastructure development, including campus development works, procurement of teaching aids, office equipment, furniture & fixtures etc.

The MoRD provides 50 per cent of the recurring expenditure to the SIRDs in 'non - North-East States' and 90 per cent of the expenditure to the SIRDs in 'North-East States'. In addition, 100 per cent reimbursement of expenditure on the salaries of five core faculty members is provided by MoRD to all SIRDs, on year to year basis.

SIRDs are expected to organise courses on the Flagship Programmes of MoRD & MoPR, Training Skills and Methodology for ETCs, Planning and implementation of RD Projects, Rural Credit, Computer Information System for RD, Courses for BDOs, Voluntary Organisations, Management Development Programmes, Integrated Watershed Development, etc.

During the year (2013-14), 12 out of 28 SIRDs submitted the Non-Recurring Grant proposals, seeking funding support for development of physical and training infrastructure (buildings, including campus development works, teaching aids and office equipment, furniture & fixtures etc.) and procurement of training-aids. The proposals submitted by SIRDs were scrutinised by NIRD&PR and an overall non-recurring Grant of ₹ 3440.50 lakh was recommended, as against the total projected/estimated cost of ₹ 7077.75 lakh asked for, by the SIRDs. The details are given in Annexure-I.

b. Strengthening of Extension Training Centres (ETCs)

The Extension Training Centres (ETCs) are the sub-State level training institutions, to impart training to the rural development functionaries and elected representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions, at block and GP level.

So far, 89 ETCs have been established and upgraded all over the country with Central assistance. Consequent upon increase in the number of developmental functionaries and the need for providing training to large number of elected representatives, members of Panchayati Raj institutions, ETCs have acquired an added importance. Central assistance to ETCs is provided by MoRD @ 100 per cent for non-recurring and up to a maximum of ₹ 20.00 lakh per ETC per annum for recurring expenditure, to enable them to cope with increased training load for capacity building of RD & PR functionaries and PRI members.

The Extension Training Centres have been conducting courses with focus on Flagship Programmes of MoRD & MoPR. In addition, they conduct courses for rural artisans, rural entrepreneurs, Self – Help Groups (SHGs), Gram Sevaks / Sevikas, Secretaries of Panchayats and Cooperatives, grassroot level functionaries of all development departments. Besides, ETCs impart training to the elected representatives of PRIs at block and GP level and to members of Village Monitoring Committees, etc.

During the year (2013-14), 12 State Governments have submitted the non-recurring grant proposals, in respect of 29 ETCs, (which includes proposals from Maharashtra and Sikkim for new ETCs at Ahmednagar, Hiwre Bazar and Phenzong, Ranka) seeking funding support for development of physical and training infrastructure (buildings, teaching aids and office furniture/equipments) and procurement of trainingaids. The proposals submitted by ETCs were scrutinised by NIRD&PR and an overall non-recurring grant of ₹ 2194.55 lakh was recommended to MoRD, as against the total projected cost of ₹ 6972.06 lakh asked for by the ETCs. The details are given in Annexure-I.

c. MoRD: Central Scheme for Strengthening of SIRDs & ETCs during 2013-14: Action Plan for Utilisation of Increased Outlay Made by SIRDs & ETCs

The SIRDs & ETCs, which were sanctioned funding support, under Central scheme, by the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD) towards non-recurring grant, during 2013-14, for strengthening of infrastructure facilities, including campus development works and procurement of teaching aids, office equipment, furniture & furnishings etc., were requested to take necessary action for utilisation of the first instalment of grant which was released by MoRD, so as to enable them to submit proposals for claiming the second and final instalment of non-recurring (NR) grant, during 2014-15. It was clarified that the SIRDs & ETCs can submit their proposals for claiming second and final instalment of non-recurring grant, along with the following documents, subject to utilisation of the total first instalment of NR grant released for each item of the infrastructure works:

> Utilisation Certificate (UC) in respect of first instalment of grant.

- ii) Audit Report (AR) in respect of first instalment of grant.
- iii) Report on progress of works on site.
- iv) Details of item-wise expenditure incurred from first instalment of grant.
- Photographs (card size) indicating the status of construction on site.
- vi) Time-frame for completion of the works in all respects.

The SIRDs were requested to take expeditious action for submission of their proposals to the MoRD, for the year 2014-15, for sanction of Gol's share of recurring grant and non-recurring grant for strengthening of infrastructure facilities, etc.

Training Performance of SIRDs and ETCs

During the year 2013-14, the SIRDs & ETCs, put together, conducted 58,189 training programmes and imparted training to 27.41 lakh RD&PR functionaries, including the elected representatives of PRIs. There has been remarkable increase in the training programmes of SIRDs & ETCs, when compared to their performance in 2012-13, during which, they conducted 55,585 programmes and trained a total of 26.75 lakh participants. DOCUMENTATION

The important role played by information in the process of rural development needs no emphasis. Centre for Media and Rural Documentation (CMRD) makes concerted efforts in identifying, collecting, systematically organising and disseminating the rural development information to the development community comprising administrators, planners, functionaries and others involved in rural development activities. The faculty, participants and the students on the NIRD&PR campus also make use of the rich information resources of CMRD in their academic pursuits. Books, reports, academic journals, audiovisual materials, etc., form important sources of information based on which the CMRD is continuously enriching the databases developed over the years. CMRD regularly brings out various information products with a view to disseminating the information to various stakeholders engaged in rural development activities at different levels.

Information Sources

Books

Books, reports and other institutional publications form major source of information. During the period under review, CMRD added a total of 623 books and other documents to its collection.

Periodicals

CHAPTER

CMRD subscribed to 142 Indian and foreign journals during the period under review. 45 journals are received on exchange and complimentary basis and about 75 newsletters are received from different rural development institutions. CMRD also subscribed to online databases viz., Indiastat.com, JSTOR and ProQuest-Social Science Journals and ebrary Social Science Collection (e-Books).

CD Rom / Video Cassettes

Audio-visual materials form a major input in the training programmes organised by the Institute. A total of 17 CDs/ DVDs were added to the collection during the period under review.

Hindi Section

CMRD maintains a separate collection of Hindi books for the benefit of participants and staff. 100 books were added to the Hindi collection in the present year.

Updation of Databases

Computerised databases of books and journal articles updated and maintained on a continuous basis form the major strength of CMRD. Based on these databases CMRD provides various information services. Presently the books database consists of 92480 books and 122598 references in Journal articles database.

CMRD Information Products / Services

CMRD Alerts, CMRD Index and Newspaper clippings are the information products through which CMRD disseminates information. All these publications were brought out regularly during the period under review. In addition, CMRD provides services like literature searches, photocopying, inter-library loan, etc., to its users.

Institutional Membership

NIRD&PR Institutional Membership offered to rural development organisations and institutions is maintained by CMRD. The members are entitled to free subscription to Journal of Rural Development, NIRD&PR Newsletter and all un-priced publications and 50 per cent discount on all priced publications of NIRD&PR.

INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

The Institute has a mandate to disseminate information on rural development. In fulfilling the mandate, the Institute brings out regularly a quarterly journal, a monthly newsletter, research highlights, and Rural Development Statistics. As a leading publisher of rural development literature in India, NIRD&PR endeavours to share its research findings, observed field realities and views on issues of current topical importance with policy planners, academics and others through its regular publications, occasional papers etc. The publications of NIRD&PR serve the policy makers in terms of providing feedback of ground level realities, offer suggestions and guidelines for better planning and management of rural development programmes.

Publications

Journals and Periodicals Journal of Rural Development

The quarterly Journal of Rural Development is the flagship publication of NIRD & PR and is one of the leading academic journals in the field of rural development and decentralised administration. With impressive circulation both within and outside the country, it is one of the most sought-after journals by the academic community, rural development administrators and planners. JRD has, over the years, built up a reputation for high standard of articles and promptness of publication.

CHAPTER

The papers received for publication are reviewed thoroughly at different levels, both by the NIRD&PR faculty and the outside subject matter specialists to ensure quality.

During the year, four issues of JRD (Vol.32 No.2, 3 and 4 and Vol.33 No.1) containing 32 articles and 18 book reviews were brought out.

NIRD&PR Newsletter

The NIRD&PR Newsletter "Pragati" a monthly publication, highlights the recommendations of various training programmes, seminars and workshops, and important events which are undertaken by NIRD&PR on a regular basis. Besides giving advance publicity on the training programmes scheduled for the next two months, the Newsletter covers the news of faculty development, success stories, visits and delegations – both India and foreign – to the Institute etc. Through this medium, NIRD&PR maintains regular contacts with SIRDs, DRDAs and NGOs. Newsletters No.215 to 226 issues from April, 2013 to March, 2014 were brought out during the year.

RURAL TECHNOLOGY PARK

The Rural Technology Park (RTP) was started at NIRD&PR campus in the year 1999. RTP has been established in an area of about 65 acres of land envisaged as an instrument for transfer of technologies to villages through dynamic approach. RTP has a vision to serve as a catalyst to accelerate wide dissemination of appropriate and affordable technologies to rural poor for increasing productivity and enhancing quality of life, thereby enabling community to move towards sustainable development. The National Rural Building Centre showcases model rural houses constructed with forty different technologies applicable to rural India and the Sanitation Park houses key sanitation. A Rural Technology Mela is organised every year and about 10000 to 12000 people each day visit from various parts of the country. Various Self-Help Groups, Government institutions, Banks, SGSY organisations etc., participate in the exhibition. RTP has also obtained ISO: 9001 - 2008 certification.

During 2013-14, RTP has taken up many initiatives which include training programmes on various Rural Technologies for Skill Development, introduction of New Technology Units, conducting of National Workshop on "Village Adoption Scheme" for integrated development of the villages by associating with Banking fraternity, introduction of Solid Waste Management Technology, installation of waterless urinals and organising a Rural Technology and Crafts Exhibition besides making efforts for popularising the Renewable Energies with specific emphasis on Solar Energy. The details of each of these activities are given below.

CHAPTER

1. New Technology /Units Introduced During the Year

i. Mushroom Cultivation and Processing Unit

Keeping in view the response the technology had received during 12th Rural Technology and Crafts Exhibition held during 14-19 February, 2014 this technology unit was established. It has the potential of generating considerable income with low investment and the product has good demand for its nutrient value.

ii. Charcoal Briquettes Making

Keeping in view the difficulties in the villages in acquiring the LPG and kerosene, and to make available the low cost fuel for cooking purposes in the villages, the technology of making charcoal from agricultural waste etc., and making briquettes from the same was introduced.

iii. Solar Pest Manager

To enable the farmers reduce the usage of pesticides this technology of attracting the pests through solar light was introduced during the year.

iv. Solar Sprayers

This technology was introduced to enable the farmers especially those growing vegetables and facing water scarcity and to work during the evenings or nights at their convenience to spray the water.

v. Solar Dryers

This is an open Solar Dryer made of bamboos. It is highly cost-effective and can be utilised for drying of the vegetables, fruits, fish etc.

vi. Cost-Effective Eco-Friendly and Improved Cooking Devices

The Chullas made of muds with different designs which emit negligible smoke or no smoke are kept for exhibition. Apart from the same, a Sarai Cooker made of steel vessels was introduced which uses charcoal briquettes and does not emit smoke.

vii. Waterless Urinals

Waterless Urinals developed by IIT, New Delhi are introduced to create awareness about the technology so that the precious water can be saved.

viii. Millets Processing Unit

This technology was introduced to create awareness with regard to the organic farming and the utility of millets. The unit demonstrates and displays the cooked food.

ix. Technology of Generating Electricity from Waste Food

This technology was introduced to create awareness with regard to the technology of catching of waste heat to convert into energy/ electricity while cooking.

x. Solar Lighting Assembling Unit

The solar lighting assembling unit is revived with cost-effective lighting products to train the unemployed youth so that this can become their source of livelihood and to ensure that the solar lighting equipment is available to villagers at affordable cost.

xi. Improved Models of Biogas Equipment

The technology of producing gas from food waste to utilise for cooking purpose through models of CSV Wardha, ARTI Phaltan, Green city of Kerala models was introduced.

2. Village Adoption and Action Research

- i. National Workshop on "Village Adoption Scheme" for integrated development of the villages was organised on 30.10.2013 associating the Regional Rural Banks, District Development Managers of NABARD and the Lead District Managers. Consequent upon the workshop, the banks identified 80 villages under the scheme for the integrated development. NIRD&PR in association with the Banks is working in the select villages for their overall development and this scheme has been named as 'NIRD&PR-Banker Model'.
- ii. During the year, RTP associated with the action research villages taken up by the Institute faculty in identifying and erecting cost-effective solar street lights in the villages which do not have the electricity grid connection/facing electricity problems.

3. Establishment of RTPs in African Countries

During the year, in consultation with the officials of MoRD, MEA, a draft agreement was arrived at for the establishment of Rural Technology Parks at Zimbabwe and Malawi as a part of IndoAfrica Forum Summit-II declaration. It was decided to establish RTPs in five African Countries namely, Zimbabwe, Malawi, South Sudan, Ivory Coast and Congo.

4 Skill Development Programmes

During the year, 30 training programmes were conducted under various skill development programmes. The number of candidates trained were 904 (466 are males and 438 are females) as per the details given below.





CHAPTER

ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES

(A) Centre for Post-Graduate Studies

With a view to developing a committed and competent cadre of Young Rural Development Management Professionals in the country, the Institute introduced a one-year Post Graduate Diploma in Rural Development Management (PGDRDM) in the year 2008. The aim of the programme is eventually to create a large pool of professional programme delivery managers whose induction is vital to the success of the rural development programmes. All the students of the PGDRDM batches completed so far have got placement in various organisations.

As per the decision taken in the IX Academic Committee Meeting held on 26-9-2013, the admissions into Post Graduate Diploma Programme in Rural Development Management (PGDRDM) programme are being done twice a year from 2013-14 onwards i.e., one Batch will be admitted into the programme from August, 2013 to July, 2014 (Batch–6) and another Batch from January 2014 to December, 2014 (Batch–7).

 Forty nine students were admitted into the PGDRDM: 2013-14 (Batch-6) from different parts of the country including International In-service students sponsored by international organisations like AARDO and CIRDAP. The batch consisted of 10 girls and the rest were boys with varied educational qualifications. The international candidates came from Ghana, Sudan, Fiji Island, Myanmar and Nepal. Forty nine students were admitted into the PGDRDM: 2014 (Batch-7) of whom eight were girls and the rest were boys with varied educational qualifications.

In both the Batches, nearly 35 per cent of the students represented the `Farm Sciences' like agriculture, horticulture and veterinary sciences while 65 per cent came from the arts, commerce and engineering group. The admission process was on the basis of an All-India Entrance Examination followed by Group Discussion and Personal Interviews.

Curriculum

The three-Trimester Programme consists of Classroom component, Field Attachment (FA), examinations, including periodical tests, assignments, project reports and final examination. The classroom component was spread over all the three trimesters and the FA component was concurrently spread over six weeks in between the time of end of Trimester – II and the beginning of Trimester – III. The Programme offers Courses with a total of 44 credits.

Field Attachment (FA) /Rural Organisational Internship

The six-week long Field Attachment (FA) or Rural Organisational Internship was administered to the Batch-6 students from 1 March to 15 April, 2014 with a view to sensitising the students on the problems of



the rural society and its dynamics. The Internship component focuses on institutions, organisational structures, organisational culture, management systems, HRD, finance, production processes, marketing, value addition, etc. The organisations for field work included: (i) Grameen Vikas Trust (GVT), (ii) MYRADA, (iii) RUDSETI, (iv) Agakhan Rural Support Programme, (v) Aroh Foundation, (vi) ICICI Foundation, (vi) CARE India, (vii) Career Launcher, (viii) CSV, Wardha, (ix) IIRD, and (x) OLM.





Forum Presentations

As part of the learning exercise, forum presentations of the experts in the area of rural development to the Sixth Batch students of PGDRDM were organised. Shri S.K. Panda, IAS, Chief Secretary, Govt. of Tripura and Shri Shriram, IA & AS, interacted with the students of PGDRDM on 24-12-2013 and 27-12-2013, respectively.




HIGHLIGHTS OF TRAINING DURING 2013-14

To address the above problem, NIRD&PR - NERC has implemented a Water Harvesting System with financial assistance from North-Eastern Council, Shillong. The water harvesting system is helpful during rainy season. Rain water is collected from roof of buildings and taken through big pipes to store in the underground sump. Filters remove leaves and other particles and collection tanks allow small particles to sink to the bottom.

Floating particles are skimmed of the surface by overflow pipes and clean water extracted from just below the surface. Water is pumped again to filter which was provided in NIRD&PR - NERC campus and same water is being released for multipurpose utilisation. It reduces demand on surface and groundwater. The project was coordinated by Shri A. Simhachalam from NERC.

NIRD&PR - NERC, Guwahati campus has long been facing water scarcity due to inadequate availability of groundwater in the area. NIRD&PR - NERC requires huge amount of water to meet the demand during training programmes for daily usages of residential campus attached to the institute. Water needs to be procured through tankers from outside suppliers due to shortage of groundwater as per demand.

Infrastructure Facilities

CHAPTER 15

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

- The Institute received ₹ 3200.00 lakh under Plan and ₹ 1409.83 lakh under Non-Plan.
- The expenditure was ₹ 3832.63 lakh under Plan (General) and ₹ 1988.60 lakh under Non-Plan.
- The Institute received ₹ 175.47 lakh towards Consultancy Projects during the year.

The functions of the Finance and Accounts division of the Institute inter alia, include Budgeting, Drawal of Funds, Accounting, classification of Receipts & Payments, Preparation & Compilation of Annual Accounts, submission of audited annual accounts to the Ministry in addition to rendering financial advice on various matters relating to administration / training / projects for decision making by the Management.

(a) General Fund : The Institute is fully funded by the Government of India, which release funds under Plan and Non-Plan with reference to the Budget approved by the Executive Council of the Institute. During the year, the Ministry of Rural Development allocated a sum of ₹ 3200.00 lakh under Plan (General) and ₹ 1409.83.00 lakh under Non-Plan as grant in aid. The Institute also earned receipts of ₹ 2493.46 lakh towards

sale of publications, subscription to journals, staff bus charges, receipt from training progammes, fees from PGDRDM, PGDSRD and PGDTDM, accrued interest on investments, venue programmes, misc. receipts, etc. Against these budget allocation, the Institute spent a sum of ₹ 3832.63 lakh under Plan (General) and ₹1988.60 lakh under Non-Plan. The expenditure under Plan comprises all amounts utilised mainly for salaries of faculty, TA, organising various training programmes, Outreach Programmes, conducting research studies including Action Research, administrative and establishment expenses, publications, RTP, PGDRDM, PGDSRD, operation of Late S R Sankaran Chair on Rural Labour, improvement of infrastructural facilities, acquisition of office equipment, computers, audio visual equipment, furniture and fitting etc., library books, journals, expenses of Health Centre, etc.

The expenditure under Non-Plan consists mainly of salaries of the non-faculty officers & staff and support services, pension to the retired employees, administrative and establishment expenses, Leave Salary & Pension Contribution, Management contribution on CPF, contingent and maintenance expenditure, etc. (b) Consultancy Account : This account deals with the consultancy fee receipts from various agencies/ organisations and expenditure incurred therefrom.

The receipts of this Account during the year was \gtrless 175.47 lakh and the expenditure was \gtrless 147.46 lakh which includes expenditure on carry forward projects from the previous year. The balance in the Account as on 31.3.2014 was \gtrless 502.59 lakh.

(c) **Development Fund**: The Development Fund is mainly raised from the savings in the consultancy projects and the interest earned on the investments made out of the savings of the consultancy account.

The fund is utilised for improvement of infrastructural facilities etc. During the year, an amount of ₹ 55.55 lakh was credited and an expenditure of ₹ 14.15 lakh was incurred on Cable TV charges and subsidy for NIRD campus staff and depreciation. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 486.84 lakh.

(d) Benevolent Fund : The fund is mainly constituted from the savings in the consultancy projects, interest income from investments out of the savings of the consultancy account and contributions from the employees of the Institute. The fund is utilised to meet the expenditure on welfare activities, financial assistance to employees etc. During the year an amount of ₹ 30.58 lakh was credited to the fund against which the expenditure was ₹ 0.86 lakh. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 320.26 lakh.

(e) Building Fund : The fund is utilised to meet the expenditure on creation of infrastructure, major renovations, etc. During the year an amount of ₹ 125.12

lakh was credited to the fund against which the expenditure on depreciation was ₹ 190.51 lakh. The expenditure on construction works was ₹ 490.66 lakh and ₹ 120.22 on Plant & Machinery. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 2637.97 lakh.

(f) Provident Fund : The fund is mainly constituted from GPF, CPF, and NPS contributions of the employees of the Institute. The Fund accounts for the contributions, interest credit, advances, withdrawals and balance of the PF of the employees. During the year, an amount of ₹ 130.72 lakh was credited to the fund against which the expenditure was ₹ 103.81 lakh. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 1595.81 lakh.

(g) NIRD Corpus Fund : The fund is mainly constituted from the savings in the consultancy fees, sponsored projects in general a/c, interest income from investments in general a/c and accumulated misc. receipts in general a/c. The fund is utilised to meet the expenditure on welfare activities, development works etc. During the year, an amount of ₹ 4136.42 lakh was credited to the fund. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 8921.79 lakh.

(h) NIRD Medical Corpus Fund : The fund is mainly constituted from the subscription of retired pensioners / family pensioners, subscription from serving employees. The fund is utilised to meet the expenditure on medical facilities to retired pensioners / family pensioners who have enrolled to the scheme. During the year, an amount of ₹ 11.99 lakh was credited to the fund against which the expenditure was ₹ 0.44 lakh. The balance in the fund as on 31.3.2014 was ₹ 40.75 lakh.



IMPLEMENTATION OF RIGHT TO INFORMATION (RTI) ACT, 2005

Keeping in view the spirit of transparency and statutory obligations, the Institute has taken steps to implement the provisions of Right to information Act, 2005 for providing information to citizens of the country in compliance of the same. NIRD&PR website provides details of mandatory disclosures as provided under RTI Act, 2005. The Institute has designated Appellate Authority, Public Information Officer, two Assistant Public Information Officers and Transparency Officer for providing information sought by the RTI applicants and their names are also displayed at NIRD&PR website. The Institute also has separate Appelate Authority and Public Information Officer for its North-Eastern Regional Centre (NERC) at Guwahati. All 229 RTI applications and appeals received from citizens during the year under reference were disposed of as per procedures and information as available and held in NIRD&PR records were made available to RTI applicants. The Institute also submitted mandatory online quarterly returns, as per procedure.
